RE: Aquatic Ecologist

Here is a copy of our film "The Aquatic Ecologist" narrated by Rod Serling. It was produced cooperatively by the College of Environmental Science and Forestry and the New York Chapter of the American Fishery Society.

There are two sections in this film which may be applicable for your program on nuclear power plants--their need, environmental consequences, the alternatives. One sequence deals with monitoring shad migration on the Connecticut River as they pass through the thermal discharge of the Connecticut-Yankee nuclear station. The other sequence deals with the very controversial Calvert Cliffs station now under construction on the Chesapeake Bay area. Here biologists are really monitoring the before and after environmental consequences and as a result we will probably have the best documentation on the affects of the nuclear station on its immediate biological surroundings.

You are welcome to use sections of this film for broadcast. Our only request is that appropriate credit be given and the film not be damaged.

As I mentioned, the New York State Sea Grant Program has had several projects dealing with power plant siting. Ronald Stewart, a research associate in Atmospheric Sciences at State University of New York, Albany was the leader of one project analyzing power plant sitings on Lake Ontario. You might wish to talk with Donald F. Squires who is Program Director for the entire Sea Grant operation in New York State. He is at State University of New York in Albany. His phone is: (518) 474-5787.

Again, thank you for your concern for this environmental issue. Although I do not consider myself an expert in the field of thermo-nuclear power, I believe that one question that should be asked loud and clearly is how much of this electrical energy do we really need and can we afford the long-term environmental consequences of meeting these needs? I don't think we can intelligently address energy needs without also addressing the American life-style and the realities that we must ultimately face in changing some of these life-styles.


FROM THE WEST: Leave Thruway at Exit 32 (Westmoreland); left beyond toll-booth on Cider St. into Oriskany approximately 3 miles. Right on Utica St. to River St. Left, cross NY 69, railroad tracks and the two one-lane bridges. Cross over NY 49 and turn right at intersection. Then bear right up hill (Chaminade Road) to Bergamo East.

FROM THE EAST: Leave the Thruway at Exit 31 (Utica). Turn north (right) on NY 8, go 300 yards to second light; turn west (left) on NY 49. NY 49 to Oriskany exit. At end of exit ramp, go straight, then up the hill (Chaminade Rd.) to Bergamo E.

SUBJECT: Final committee report

The Procedural Manual Committee has completed its assignment and we submit, for your approval, the accompanying document entitled "Guide for AFS Division and Chapter Officers and Committee Chairmen." A second draft was prepared and mailed out to all AFS officers, and Division and Chapter presidents for their comments. A few people responded and many of their suggestions are incorporated in this final manuscript. It is my understanding that final printing will await a 1-year trial in the hands of current Division and Chapter officers.

I wish to add that my committee had considerable input into this document and their responses to my requests were very good. We appreciated this opportunity to serve the Society and work with a fine leader.

Guide for AFS Division and Chapter Officers and Committee Chairmen

Foreword

In response to requests for some definitive guidelines for Division and Chapter officers and committee chairmen, this brochure was prepared by a committee appointed by President J. Cameron Stevenson in 1975. The purpose of this pamphlet is to assist these people in fulfilling their responsibilities to these subdivisions of the American Fisheries Society (AFS). Division and Chapter bylaws do not spell out in detail all the duties of officers and appointees, nor should they do so. As a result, confusion and apprehension assail many newly elected officers and chairmen concerning their roles and the relationship of their Division or Chapter to the Parent Society and to each other. It is hoped and expected that the procedures and duties outlined in this brochure will materially assist those who will make use of it.

Recognizing at the outset that each organization has its own goals and special problems, nevertheless there are certain procedures that are common to all. We start with the requirement that all elected officials are members of AFS in good standing and proceed to delineate their duties under two parts--Division and Chapter. Special emphasis is placed on the inter-relationships between these bodies and the Parent Society and/or Division by means of asterisks (**).

Division Officers

The following suggestions for Division officers serve as reminders of the duties they have toward fulfilling their respective obligations to their office. They are neither listed necessarily in order of importance nor are they likely to be all-inclusive. Innovations that will enhance the objectives of the respective Divisions are always encouraged.

President

1. Upon assuming office, the newly elevated president should:
 - a. Present the out-going president with the past-president's certificate.
 - b. Announce appointments of standing committee chairmen.
 - c. Announce appointments of ad hoc committee chairmen if possible.
 - d. Complete committee appointments within one month.

2. Be specific in your charges to your committee chairmen and maintain close liaison with them.
- **3. Notify the AFS Executive Director of the names of committee chairmen and inform the secretary, president-elect and other members of the Executive Committee of the entire composition of the committees.
- **4. As a voting member of the AFS Executive Committee you have an obligation to attend both the interim spring meeting and annual fall meeting of this committee for two years. If you cannot attend, fully brief the president-elect who can act as your representative.
- **5. Prepare a written report on Division activities for presentation at each of the aforementioned Executive Committee meetings.
6. Keep president-elect, secretary-treasurer and the other members of the Executive Committee informed on Division activities and furnish them with copies of all pertinent correspondence.
7. Maintain close liaison with Chapters within the Division and attend annual Chapter business meetings whenever possible. When unable to do so, arrange for another officer to represent the Division.
8. Possess a copy of both the Division bylaws and Society constitution and bylaws. Be familiar with them.
9. Familiarize yourself with Society guidelines concerning lobbying activities. It is very important that all officers protect the Society's tax-exempt status.
10. Know how to conduct a meeting--i. e., be familiar with pertinent sections of Roberts' "Rules of order." Paperback editions are available for a nominal charge from local bookstores.
11. Assist the secretary-treasurer in the preparation of next year's budget.
12. Organize and conduct a meeting of the Division Executive Committee prior to the annual business meeting. Scheduling and room arrangements must be made in advance with the chairman of the local arrangements committee. Each Executive Committee member should have an agenda prior to the meeting. Review all committee reports at this meeting.
13. Conduct the annual business meeting.
 - a. Adhere to a time schedule.
 - b. Prepare and present brief remarks on the status of the Division. (This same message may also be appropriate for the Division Newsletter and as a report to the AFS Executive Committee.)
 - c. Introduce any AFS officers present and give them an opportunity to address the membership. Introductions of past presidents of the Society and Division, other Division officers, and distinguished guests also are in order.

- d. Install the new president in a dignified ceremony. It is suggested that the president-elect be escorted to the rostrum by two past presidents.
- 14. Acknowledge the work of your committee chairmen by letter.
- **15. As past president of the Division, you will serve a second year on the Executive Committees of both the Division and Parent Society. As a voting member you should attend these meetings.

President-Elect

- **1. Keep abreast of Division (and Society) activities and be prepared to preside over the Executive Committee meeting and/or the annual meeting in the absence of the president. You will also substitute, if necessary, for the Division president on the Society Executive Committee.
- 2. Attend and participate in Division meetings.
- 3. Present out-going president with his past-president's certificate upon assuming the office of Division president. Obtain certificate from secretary-treasurer.
- 4. Recruit chairmen for standing committees prior to the annual meeting of the Division.
- 5. Assist with the preparation of the budget for the ensuing year.
- 6. Be familiar with Division bylaws and Society constitution and bylaws.
- 7. Other responsibilities vary between Divisions, and the president-elect should be aware of these obligations prior to taking office and fulfill them in a capable manner.
- **8. The presidents-elect of the Southern and North Central divisions must make their appointments for chairmen of the Membership and Resolutions committees prior to the Parent Society annual meeting that precedes their Division annual meeting. Notify the Executive Director of same before said AFS meeting.

Secretary-Treasurer

- **1. Furnish minutes of the annual business meeting to the AFS Executive Director within 30 days after the meeting, as noted in the bylaws. Copies of same should be furnished also to each member of the Executive Committee. Addresses of the new officers should accompany this report.
- 2. Take minutes at Executive Committee meetings and supply each committee member with a copy.
- **3. Resolutions and amendments to the bylaws must be forwarded to the Executive Director of AFS within 30 days of adoption for approval by the Society's Executive Committee.

4. Obtain a list of attendees at annual meetings and ascertain if there is a quorum. Furnish attendance lists for the preceding three years to the chairman of the Nominating Committee.
5. Order a past-president's certificate from the Executive Director 6 weeks prior to the annual meeting and deliver same to president-elect.
- **6. Receive and acknowledge reports from chapter secretaries and maintain an up-dated list of chapter officers. Keep a file on Chapter activities and dates of their meetings.
- **7. Notify Society officers and Executive Director of annual meeting date and location.
8. Maintain a supply of Division bylaws, retain Division records and correspondence, and furnish ballots for elections at annual meetings. A copy of each Division publication should be retained in the Division's files.
9. Administer Division funds, prepare a financial report for the annual meeting, and furnish records to auditing committee before annual meeting.
10. Deposit Division funds in an interest-bearing account since relatively few checks are drawn on this account. The account should have two signatures--preferably, but not necessarily, another officer, former officer, or member of the Executive Committee. The Federal Employers Identification Number assigned to the Division can be used in lieu of a Social Security number if requested by the bank.
11. Authorization for major withdrawals usually comes from the Executive Committee but advance authorization for intermittent small withdrawals to carry on Division business should be sought from the Committee at their annual meeting.
12. Outstanding bills should be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee at the annual meeting.
13. Prepare a tentative budget for the ensuing year, in consultation with the president and president-elect, and submit same to the Division Executive Committee prior to the annual meeting.

Chapter Officers

The diversity of Chapter operations is usually greater than among the Divisions. To some officers these suggestions will be superfluous but to others they should be helpful reminders.

President

1. Upon assuming office, the newly elevated president should:
 - a. Present the out-going president with the past-president's certificate.

- b. Announce appointments of standing committee chairmen.
 - c. Make appointments of ad hoc committee chairmen at this time if possible.
 - **d. Complete committee appointments within one month. Notify Division secretary of committee chairmen.
2. Be specific in your charges to your committee chairmen and keep abreast of committee activities.
 - **3. Keep Division president and secretary informed on Chapter activities.
 4. Be familiar with Chapter and Division bylaws and AFS constitution and bylaws.
 - **5. You will represent the Chapter in Society affairs as requested.
 6. Be aware of Society safeguards concerning lobbying activities by the Chapter to protect the Society's tax-exempt status.
 - **7. As a voting member of the Executive Committee of the Division, you are expected to attend and participate in any meetings of same called by the Division president.
 - **8. Present a brief written report of Chapter activities at the annual Division Executive Committee meeting.
 9. Know how to conduct a meeting--i.e., be familiar with Roberts' Rules of Order.
 10. Schedule and preside over all Executive Committee meetings.
 11. You are responsible for arrangements and agenda for Chapter meetings:
 - a. Adhere to a time schedule.
 - b. Introduce any AFS and Division officers present and give them an opportunity to address the membership.
 - c. Install the new president in a dignified ceremony. It is suggested that the vice president be escorted to the rostrum by two past presidents.
 12. Acknowledge the work of your officers and committee chairmen by letter at the end of the year.
 13. Inform your successor of action taken at the previous Division Executive Committee meeting and see that he/she gets minutes of same.
 14. As indicated in the Chapter bylaws, you will serve on the Chapter Executive Committee for an additional year as immediate past president.

Vice President

1. Chair the Program Committee.
2. Preside over Chapter and Executive Committee meetings in the absence of the President.
3. Be familiar with the Chapter bylaws.

Secretary-Treasurer

- **1. Furnish a copy of the minutes of the annual business meeting to the Executive Director of the Society and Division secretary within 30 days after the meeting.
2. Keep minutes of all official meetings and retain all Chapter records. Copies of minutes should be furnished to Executive Committee members.
- **3. Submit copies of Chapter resolutions promptly to the Division secretary and the Executive Director. Indicate those for which the Division and Society support is requested.
- **4. Notify the membership of the annual business meeting at least one month in advance; at least two weeks in advance for special and/or interim meetings. (Some chapters meet monthly and perhaps mailings of notices are too expensive and not necessary.) Division officers, the Society President and Executive Director also should be informed of the annual business meeting.
5. Ascertain if there is a quorum present for official actions and furnish ballots for elections.
- **6. Keep a supply of Chapter bylaws on hand and be familiar with their content. Forward proposed amendments of same promptly to the Executive Director for action by the Society's Executive Committee.
7. Maintain a membership roster for the Chapter. Send it to the Executive Director and request an update on AFS membership status of the members three months prior to the annual business meeting. Society bylaws stipulate that only a member in good standing can be an officer or have a vote.
8. Order a past-president's certificate 6 weeks prior to the annual meeting.
9. Submit a financial report at the annual business meeting.
10. Deposit Chapter funds in an interest-bearing account if the bank does not charge a check-writing fee for the relatively few checks drawn during the course of a year. Use Federal Employers Identification number assigned to the Chapter in lieu of a Social Security number. Two signatures are needed--yours and, preferably, a member of the Executive Committee.

11. Obtain authorization from the Executive Committee for intermittent small withdrawals to cover expenses.
12. Outstanding bills should be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee at their meetings.

Chairmen of Standing Committees

Divisions and Chapters establish a variety of committees at one time or another and it is not possible to delineate procedures that would apply to all. Chairmen for these committees, however, should be given some direction by the president as to their objective and the need for the committee. It would be helpful, too, to suggest a deadline for results and a report. Certain standing committees usually are common to all, namely Membership, Nominating, Resolutions, Arrangements and Program.

According to Society bylaws, Division chairmen of the Membership and Resolutions committees automatically serve on the respective Parent Society committees. Furthermore, they must serve during a complete Society "year" (Sept-Sept). Division annual meetings are staggered throughout the calendar year so the following procedure must be adhered to in order to comply with this AFS bylaw:

1. Chairmen of the Western and Northeastern Divisions' Membership and Resolutions committees will assume their responsibilities on the Society's committees at the next AFS annual meeting following their appointment by the Division president and will serve during the ensuing Society year.

2. Chairmen of these two committees in the Southern and North Central Divisions will be appointed by the presidents-elect of these Divisions (and the Executive Director will be notified of these appointments) prior to the Parent Society's next annual meeting. These individuals will serve on the Society committees during the ensuing Society year. Responsibilities to their Division committees will encompass the period between successive annual meetings of the Division following their appointment.

The following guidelines are offered to assist the work of these chairmen.

Membership

1. Obtain a representative from each state or province to serve on the Division committee.
2. Consult with previous chairman for records on membership recruiting activities the previous year.

3. Encourage, by letter, active participation by each committee member.
4. Follow up with at least two letters during the year asking for progress reports.
5. Furnish AFS membership applications to each committee member.
6. Give some guidelines to the committee such as: (1) provide lists of current AFS members in the state or province; (2) contact prospect personally by telephone and/or by mail; (3) send applications and money to Executive Director and notify the chairman.
7. Present a written report at the annual meeting of the Division.
8. Furnish names and addresses to the secretary so that he can notify the individual responsible for mailing the Newsletter and for meeting announcements.
9. Acknowledge work of committee members at end of the year.

Nominating

1. Suggest that each committee member submit the names of two nominees for each office.
2. Compile this list (along with your nominees) and offer this list to the committee for a vote on their preferences.
3. Select the top two candidates for each office on the basis of votes received from the committee, confirm the willingness of selected candidates to serve if elected, and offer this slate to the membership at the annual meeting. If membership balloting is by mail, coordinate your activities with the secretary-treasurer.
4. Be prepared to offer some background material for each nominee.
5. Prepare a written report for the annual meeting. Select a substitute from the committee if you cannot attend. Present the nominees for office and provide for nominations from the floor.
6. Inform candidates for Division representative to the Nominating Committee of the Parent Society that the Division representative serves during the next Society year (Sept-Sept) following the Division annual meeting. Thus he might be elected anywhere from 2-10 months prior to the formation of the Society's Nominating Committee, depending on the meeting dates of the respective Divisions. This is necessary because this committee must complete its deliberations before the March meeting of the AFS Executive Committee.
7. Allow about 3 months to complete the correspondence needed for the work of these committees.
8. Acknowledge the work of the committee personally or by letter.

Resolutions

1. Consult pp. 328 and 329 in "A Century of Fisheries in North America" which define and describe the nature of resolutions and their format.
2. Advise your committee to watch and record important issues and problems that arise during the year on the international, national, regional and local levels.
3. Contact your committee 3 months prior to annual meetings to compile suggestions and prepare rough drafts of resolutions.
4. If possible, call a committee meeting to discuss the issues and prepare the resolutions; otherwise, it will have to be done by correspondence.
5. Prepare the final draft carefully. Special attention is needed to assure a resolution contains the desired wording. Present same to the membership at the annual meeting. There also may be a need for the passing of current, urgent Resolutions at other Chapter meetings. Appropriate resolutions should be accompanied with a recommendation for further support from the Division and/or the Parent Society, if so desired.
6. Be familiar with Society guidelines concerning lobbying activities so that any action taken as a result of a resolution does not endanger tax-exempt status of the Society but still will fulfill the Chapter objective.
7. Acknowledge work of committee members at the end of the year.

Arrangements

1. Make appointments to cover most, if not all, the following details:
 - Lodging
 - Pre-registration, registration and welcoming arrangements
 - Meeting room assignments, audio-visual equipment, and operators
 - Banquet and entertainment
 - Social hours or smokers
 - Exhibits
 - Program printing
 - Ladies activities
 - Field trips
2. Stay within budget allotted by Executive Committee
3. Schedule and preside over meetings of this committee.
4. Keep General Chairman informed on progress.
5. Schedule final meeting one week before conference to finalize arrangements.
6. Be prepared to handle special emergencies.
7. Acknowledge work of committee members at the end of the year.

Program

1. Arrange for committee meetings to do the following:
 - a. Select themes for the conference.
 - b. Appoint chairmen for the various sessions.
 - c. Confer with General Chairman on invitations to keynote or opening session speakers.
2. Issue first call for papers 6 months prior to conference and include instructions to participants.
3. Issue final call 3 months ahead of conference.
4. Coordinate activities with arrangements committee.
5. Complete program in time for printing deadline.
6. Acknowledge work of committee members at end of the year.

NOTES

New York Chapter - American Fisheries Society - Water Quality Committee Report

It appears that this Committee can best serve the Chapter by providing information on current water quality problems and by encouraging a positive force to combat such problems. These goals can best be accomplished by verbal reports and group participation. In this way problems can be presented and aired rather than just having this Committee present a dull report.

In keeping with this viewpoint, and with the permission of the individuals involved, the following water quality subjects are scheduled for presentation at this meeting: (1) certainly the number 1 subject in 1975 - the PCB problem, which John Spagnoli will address, (2) Bill Eustance is presenting a paper on Catskill water quality, and (3) Larry Skinner has agreed to brief us on the water quality of the Hudson River. These three subjects are to be included as a part of this report.

Another area of concern to all of us has been the problem of chlorine, and in particular the chlorination of STP effluents in Class C waters and its effects on fish and benthic organisms. There is now a proposal to limit such treatments, and I think that John Spagnoli can further enlighten us on this.

If any of you have suggestions as to how this Committee can better serve this group they will be gratefully accepted.

We have done well but with the present large, diversified, and young membership we can and should do even better.

1965 March - Fishery COOP Workshop at Cornell - Subject "Age and Growth of Fish." On March 10, 1965 at this meeting John Gould suggested creation of the N.Y. Association of Fishery Biologists.

October - Rome, N.Y. meeting of N.Y. Conservation Department Bureau of Fish - Organizational meeting of Professional Fisheries Association of New York - (Initially N.Y. Association of Fishery Biologists.)

1966 March - First meeting of the "Professional Fisheries Association of N.Y. (PFANY) - Met in conjunction with the Fishery COOP Workshop at Cornell - Subject "Statistics". President - John Gould - Membership - 68.

At the meeting the members present agreed nearly unanimously that the advantages inherent in our fisheries group - i.e., the unique opportunities for really productive, searching discussion of fisheries research and management topics of mutual interest by all fisheries workers of the State - would be greatly reduced by changing over to a "joint meeting" arrangement with Wildlife Chapter. 1972 January - Joint meeting with Wildlife Chapter - "How Does Fish and Wildlife Fit into the New N.Y. Dept. of Environmental Conservation." President - Howard Loeb. Membership - 91.

First Chapter News Letter - Ned Holmes Editor. Last year of N.Y. Fish News (Dept. publication). Work still progressing on film "The Aquatic Ecologist".

1973 February - Seventh annual joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "Fish and Wildlife Values, Conflict or Concord". President - Martin Pfeiffer. Membership - 97.

For the first time $\frac{1}{2}$ day was devoted to separate sessions. Fisheries subject was "Fish Management Today - Where Do We Go from Here". Film "The Aquatic Ecologist" nearing completion.

1974 January - Eighth annual joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter - Theme - "Fish & Wildlife in Regional Planning: The Adirondacks and Beyond". President - Bill Pearce. Membership - 74.

Separate Fisheries Session Saturday morning "Role of Forage Fish in Salmonid Management". This was an excellent session with speakers such as N. V. Martin from Ontario. A real bright spot compared to most joint sessions.

Film - "The Aquatic Ecologist" was finally completed. Dave Haselman and Bernie Holtman who produced the film did an excellent job and covered over 10,000 miles gathering material. The College of Forestry at Syracuse contributed the services of Dave and Bernie and the N.Y. Chapter begged, borrowed and pleaded (plus sold some film) to come up with the \$11,500 needed by the end of 1974. Steve Simkins was Committee Chairman through to the end with Dwight Webster and Bill Flick committee members attending all meetings for 6 years. Bob Werner was the super salesman that handled film distribution following completion and collected sale money to get us out of debt.

1975 February - Ninth (and last) joint meeting with the Wildlife Chapter. Also involved in this meeting were The Soil Conservation Service, and the N.Y. Upstate Chapter of the American Institute of Planners. Theme - "Environmental Aspects in Land Use - Preservation vs. Development". President - Bill Pearce. Membership - 84.

There was very little interest in this meeting (no separate session for fisheries) and total attendance was 24 with 28 needed for a quorum. Officers from the previous year were asked to continue serving.

Film - "The Aquatic Ecologist" received an award for reaching the finals in the American Film Festival. It was also accepted for entry in the "Cine Film Festival". It was selected by the United States Information Agency for use in their Science Reports. A short made from the film was made into 22 languages and sent to 84 countries.

John Nickum presented a draft of the call for papers. He has labeled this a Fisheries Meeting sponsored by the New York Chapter of the American Fisheries Society. This avoids conflict with the parent organization in view of the requirement that chapter members also belong to the National Chapter.

It was agreed that the business meeting be held Friday afternoon from 1 - 3 to be followed by technical sessions late Friday afternoon, Friday evening, and Saturday morning. Possible panel discussion topics were discussed.



standards for fishery biologists; an aquaculture film. No consensus was reached and the committee will continue to search for an appropriate use for the money. It was suggested that this small sum might be used as seed money for a matching grant from some corporation if the right project were found. For this reason we should consider more expensive projects as well as those whose cost would fall within the \$1700 limit.

There being no new business and no further old business the meeting was adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

I am writing to encourage you to give the American Fisheries Society some badly needed assistance.

As you may know, the Sustaining Membership that we had underway for nearly twelve years failed to produce anywhere near the revenue that we had anticipated. This was a personal disappointment to me, because I was president of the Society in 1964 when we adopted the program. I thought it might help us to achieve that level of financing which was essential if we were to provide needed service to professional fishery workers without a counterproductive dues structure.







2. Be specific in your charges to your committee chairmen and maintain close liaison with them.
- **3. Notify the AFS Executive Director of the names of committee chairmen and inform the secretary, president-elect and other members of the Executive Committee of the entire composition of the committees.
- **4. As a voting member of the AFS Executive Committee you have an obligation to attend both the interim spring meeting and annual fall meeting of this committee for two years. If you cannot attend, fully brief the president-elect who can act as your representative.
- **5. Prepare a written report on Division activities for presentation at each of the aforementioned Executive Committee meetings.
6. Keep president-elect, secretary-treasurer and the other members of the Executive Committee informed on Division activities and furnish them with copies of all pertinent correspondence.
7. Maintain close liaison with Chapters within the Division and attend annual Chapter business meetings whenever possible. When unable to do so, arrange for another officer to represent the Division.
8. Possess a copy of both the Division bylaws and Society constitution and bylaws. Be familiar with them.
9. Familiarize yourself with Society guidelines concerning lobbying activities. It is very important that all officers protect the Society's tax-exempt status.
10. Know how to conduct a meeting--i.e., be familiar with pertinent sections of Roberts' "Rules of order." Paperback editions are available for a nominal charge from local bookstores.
11. Assist the secretary-treasurer in the preparation of next year's budget.
12. Organize and conduct a meeting of the Division Executive Committee prior to the annual business meeting. Scheduling and room arrangements must be made in advance with the chairman of the local arrangements committee. Each Executive Committee member should have an agenda prior to the meeting. Review all committee reports at this meeting.
13. Conduct the annual business meeting.
 - a. Adhere to a time schedule.
 - b. Prepare and present brief remarks on the status of the Division. (This same message may also be appropriate for the Division Newsletter and as a report to the AFS Executive Committee.)
 - c. Introduce any AFS officers present and give them an opportunity to address the membership. Introductions of past presidents of the Society and Division, other Division officers, and distinguished guests also are in order.

4. Obtain a list of attendees at annual meetings and ascertain if there is a quorum. Furnish attendance lists for the preceding three years to the chairman of the Nominating Committee.
5. Order a past-president's certificate from the Executive Director 6 weeks prior to the annual meeting and deliver same to president-elect.
- **6. Receive and acknowledge reports from chapter secretaries and maintain an up-dated list of chapter officers. Keep a file on Chapter activities and dates of their meetings.
- **7. Notify Society officers and Executive Director of annual meeting date and location.
8. Maintain a supply of Division bylaws, retain Division records and correspondence, and furnish ballots for elections at annual meetings. A copy of each Division publication should be retained in the Division's files.
9. Administer Division funds, prepare a financial report for the annual meeting, and furnish records to auditing committee before annual meeting.
10. Deposit Division funds in an interest-bearing account since relatively few checks are drawn on this account. The account should have two signatures--preferably, but not necessarily, another officer, former officer, or member of the Executive Committee. The Federal Employers Identification Number assigned to the Division can be used in lieu of a Social Security number if requested by the bank.
11. Authorization for major withdrawals usually comes from the Executive Committee but advance authorization for intermittent small withdrawals to carry on Division business should be sought from the Committee at their annual meeting.
12. Outstanding bills should be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee at the annual meeting.
13. Prepare a tentative budget for the ensuing year, in consultation with the president and president-elect, and submit same to the Division Executive Committee prior to the annual meeting.

Chapter Officers

The diversity of Chapter operations is usually greater than among the Divisions. To some officers these suggestions will be superfluous but to others they should be helpful reminders.

President

1. Upon assuming office, the newly elevated president should:
 - a. Present the out-going president with the past-president's certificate.

Vice President

1. Chair the Program Committee.
2. Preside over Chapter and Executive Committee meetings in the absence of the President.
3. Be familiar with the Chapter bylaws.

Secretary-Treasurer

- **1. Furnish a copy of the minutes of the annual business meeting to the Executive Director of the Society and Division secretary within 30 days after the meeting.
2. Keep minutes of all official meetings and retain all Chapter records. Copies of minutes should be furnished to Executive Committee members.
- **3. Submit copies of Chapter resolutions promptly to the Division secretary and the Executive Director. Indicate those for which the Division and Society support is requested.
- **4. Notify the membership of the annual business meeting at least one month in advance; at least two weeks in advance for special and/or interim meetings. (Some chapters meet monthly and perhaps mailings of notices are too expensive and not necessary.) Division officers, the Society President and Executive Director also should be informed of the annual business meeting.
5. Ascertain if there is a quorum present for official actions and furnish ballots for elections.
- **6. Keep a supply of Chapter bylaws on hand and be familiar with their content. Forward proposed amendments of same promptly to the Executive Director for action by the Society's Executive Committee.
7. Maintain a membership roster for the Chapter. Send it to the Executive Director and request an update on AFS membership status of the members three months prior to the annual business meeting. Society bylaws stipulate that only a member in good standing can be an officer or have a vote.
8. Order a past-president's certificate 6 weeks prior to the annual meeting.
9. Submit a financial report at the annual business meeting.
10. Deposit Chapter funds in an interest-bearing account if the bank does not charge a check-writing fee for the relatively few checks drawn during the course of a year. Use Federal Employers Identification number assigned to the Chapter in lieu of a Social Security number. Two signatures are needed--yours and, preferably, a member of the Executive Committee.

3. Encourage, by letter, active participation by each committee member.
4. Follow up with at least two letters during the year asking for progress reports.
5. Furnish AFS membership applications to each committee member.
6. Give some guidelines to the committee such as: (1) provide lists of current AFS members in the state or province; (2) contact prospect personally by telephone and/or by mail; (3) send applications and money to Executive Director and notify the chairman.
7. Present a written report at the annual meeting of the Division.
8. Furnish names and addresses to the secretary so that he can notify the individual responsible for mailing the Newsletter and for meeting announcements.
9. Acknowledge work of committee members at end of the year.

Nominating

1. Suggest that each committee member submit the names of two nominees for each office.
2. Compile this list (along with your nominees) and offer this list to the committee for a vote on their preferences.
3. Select the top two candidates for each office on the basis of votes received from the committee, confirm the willingness of selected candidates to serve if elected, and offer this slate to the membership at the annual meeting. If membership balloting is by mail, coordinate your activities with the secretary-treasurer.
4. Be prepared to offer some background material for each nominee.
5. Prepare a written report for the annual meeting. Select a substitute from the committee if you cannot attend. Present the nominees for office and provide for nominations from the floor.
6. Inform candidates for Division representative to the Nominating Committee of the Parent Society that the Division representative serves during the next Society year (Sept-Sept) following the Division annual meeting. Thus he might be elected anywhere from 2-10 months prior to the formation of the Society's Nominating Committee, depending on the meeting dates of the respective Divisions. This is necessary because this committee must complete its deliberations before the March meeting of the AFS Executive Committee.
7. Allow about 3 months to complete the correspondence needed for the work of these committees.
8. Acknowledge the work of the committee personally or by letter.

Program

1. Arrange for committee meetings to do the following:
 - a. Select themes for the conference.
 - b. Appoint chairmen for the various sessions.
 - c. Confer with General Chairman on invitations to keynote or opening session speakers.
2. Issue first call for papers 6 months prior to conference and include instructions to participants.
3. Issue final call 3 months ahead of conference.
4. Coordinate activities with arrangements committee.
5. Complete program in time for printing deadline.
6. Acknowledge work of committee members at end of the year.

It appears that this Committee can best serve the Chapter by providing information on current water quality problems and by encouraging a positive force to combat such problems. These goals can best be accomplished by verbal reports and group participation. In this way problems can be presented and aired rather than just having this Committee present a dull report.

In keeping with this viewpoint, and with the permission of the individuals involved, the following water quality subjects are scheduled for presentation at this meeting: (1) certainly the number 1 subject in 1975 - the PCB problem, which John Spagnoli will address, (2) Bill Eustance is presenting a paper on Catskill water quality, and (3) Larry Skinner has agreed to brief us on the water quality of the Hudson River. These three subjects are to be included as a part of this report.

Another area of concern to all of us has been the problem of chlorine, and in particular the chlorination of STP effluents in Class C waters and its effects on fish and benthic organisms. There is now a proposal to limit such treatments, and I think that John Spagnoli can further enlighten us on this.

If any of you have suggestions as to how this Committee can better serve this group they will be gratefully accepted.

1976 Annual Meeting Minutes

The meeting, held at Bergamo East, Marcy, New York, was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by President Pearce.

Executive Committee Report: Bill Pearce reported that several meetings of this committee were held and that he had attended the Planning and Resource Societies Inter-Regional Conference at Toronto in October 1975.

Secretary-Treasurers Report: As of this date, exclusive of members signed up at this meeting, there were 55 paid-up members in 1975 and 15 prepaid members for 1976. (During the meeting 73 people paid 1976 dues). There were four mailings to the membership since the 1975 annual meeting.

On January 31, 1975, balance in the checking account was \$95.28 and \$416.82 in the savings account, making a total of \$512.10. On February 3, 1976, the checking account balance was \$89.55 and the savings account was \$437.90 for a total of \$527.45.

Membership Committee Report: Vice President Bob Werner sent out 100 meeting announcements.

Resolutions Committee Report: None - Bill Shepherd absent.

Nominating Committee Report: Committee was composed of E. D. Holmes, C. L. Smith and W. F. Shepherd. They proposed a slate of officers as follows: President Bob Werner, Vice President Cliff Creech, Secretary-Treasurer C. Lavette Smith. A motion was made by Bill Eustance, seconded by Bill Flick to accept the slate as presented. There being no nominations from the floor the Secretary cast one ballot.

Status of film, Aquatic Ecologist: Bob Werner reported that there were 19 copies sold during the past year which, together with the previous 36, made a total of 55 copies. Three copies were given away and there are 40 preview requests to be filled.

Dwight Webster suggested a report on the film be sent to Bob Youngs of N.Y.S. Conservation Council and to Dick Stroud of Sport Fishing Institute. Bob Werner to draft letter.

Bill Flick made a motion, seconded by R. Werner, that money (±\$2,000) to be transferred to the Chapter account be kept in a separate account for possible future projects. The motion was carried unanimously.
