Dear Mr. Sullivan:

John Grim has asked that I respond to your request for status information on the Prattsville pumped storage power project.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) proceedings on the project are on-going with the affirmative case being presented by the Power Authority of the State of New York (PASNY); Dr. Edward Raney is now on the witness stand. Currently there are over 70 intervenors in the proceeding; all testimony was prefiled except documents being entered as a result of discovery procedures or as need is generated for specific documents. The Society appears to have three options, i.e. (1) petition to intervene which may require investment in a transcript but offers an opportunity to file a brief at the end of the hearing, or (2) join another intervenor which may reduce costs but may limit the scope of the societies input to the proceedings, or (3) not participate in the proceeding.

On November 26, 1980, in a declaratory statement, the N.Y.S. Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) determined that a SPDES permit is required for the discharge of waters to the Schoharie Reservoir but not to the Shandaken Tunnel and thus Esopus Creek. The facility requires a Section 401 Water Quality Certification in order to obtain a FERC license; however, it appears that the 401 certification may not be issued due to probable non-compliance with thermal limitations contained DEC regulations (see attached Parts 700-704). PASNY has the option of applying for a waiver of the Part 704 thermal regulations which may require a public hearing.

Some people you may wish to contact for more information are Gary Morgans (tel: 202-357-8487) and David Boergers (tel: 202-357-8492) both from FERC and Stan Bryer (tel: 212-682-2740) representing the Esopus Creek Defense Fund, Trout Unlimited and the Theodore Gordon Flyfishers.

The New York Chapter is not entering into any action regarding the proposal since our membership includes several individuals representing both sides of the issue, thus there may be conflict of interest problems. In addition, we are not capable of providing the necessary review functions except as individual members already participating in the proceedings. We shall provide, if desired, updates on DEC actions which may affect the proceedings.

AN ACT to amend the tax law and the state finance law, in relation to
gifts for fish and wildlife management

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assem-
bly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. The tax law is amended by adding a new section six hundred
2 twenty-three to read as follows:
3 § 623. Gift for fish and wildlife management. A resident taxpayer,
4 eligible for a personal income tax refund, may request the comptroller
5 to credit the conservation fund as established by subdivision (a) of
6 section eighty-three of the state finance law a specified amount from
7 his refund, and any taxpayer may add to his tax due a specified amount
8 to be credited to such fund. Such contributions shall be made in any
9 amount. The state tax commission shall make provisions for an appropri-
10 ate box or place on the return form in which the taxpayer may indicate
11 his gift.

12 § 2. Subdivisions (a) and (c) of section eighty-three of the state
13 finance law, subdivision (a) as amended by chapter one hundred sixty-
14 nine of the laws of nineteen hundred fifty-three and subdivision (c) as
15 amended by chapter six hundred fifty-two of the laws of nineteen hundred
16 sixty-nine, are amended to read as follows:

MEMORANDUM

To: New York Chapter and New York State, American Fisheries Society Members
From: Joseph Gorsuch, President, New York Chapter, AFS
Re: Dingell-Johnson Expansion Bill

The American Fisheries Society needs the help of all its members now. New York could hold the key to the ultimate success of the Dingell-Johnson Expansion Bill effort. The D-J program began in 1950 with the implementation of the D-J Act and has provided an average of \$11.3 million per year to state fish and wildlife agencies for developing and improving fish management techniques, protecting aquatic habitat, providing public access to fishing waters, and construction of new fishing lakes. This revenue is generated from a 10% manufacturers level federal tax on sport fishing equipment. The "D-J Expansion" is an effort to amend the D-J Act by extending the 10% excise tax to fish hooks, fishing lines, and miscellaneous accessories, plus a 3% manufacturers excise tax on certain recreational boats, boat motors and boat trailers. The stakes are 80-100 million new dollars per year for fisheries resource protection, research, and management. A survey of the fifty state fisheries agencies, conducted by the American Fisheries Society (1980-81), disclosed that 116.8 million additional dollars are urgently needed annually to properly manage their recreational fisheries resources. With the Federal Government budget cuts being passed, the need for additional state funding is a must, if fisheries agencies are to continue functioning. The D-J monies will help improve salt water and freshwater angling for coastal states, such as New York.

The D-J Expansion Bills have been introduced into the House of Representatives (H.R. 2250) and the United States Senate (S. 546). Members of Congressional Subcommittees now hold "life or death" influence over these Bills. For this reason, I implore you to write New York Congressman William Carney, House Subcommittee on Fisheries and Wildlife Conservation and the Environment and New York Senator Daniel Moynihan, Senate Subcommittee on Environmental Pollution. Your own message should (1) urge support for the Bill by number (H.R. 2250 in the House and S. 546 in the Senate); (2) point out the importance of the funding to fisheries resource protection; and (3) point out the importance to New York and the future of sport fishing. Hand-written letters are just as effective as those typed. Letterhead is not required, but it is of course acceptable.

juvenile alewives show a size-related distribution pattern similar to American Shad; the larger individuals are further downstream. This pattern may be due to faster growth in the more saline lower estuary, differential size-related downstream movement, or both.

We hope that the presentation of these hypotheses will stimulate the search for corroborative evidence.

Trawl Comparison in the Northern Newburgh Bay Area of the Hudson River
Michael Bonomo and Martin Daley; Lawler, Matusky and Skelly,
Engineers, Pearl River, New York 10965

The efficiency of a 7.92-m otter trawl as a surface and mid-depth fish sampler was compared to an 11.89-m yankee trawl. Both gear are designed as bottom trawls but have been used to sample fish in the upper water column. The fishing mouth area of the semi-balloon-type yankee trawl was determined to be approximately five times that of the flat otter trawl. The two trawls were hypothesized to be equally efficient if there was no difference in the catch per unit volume or size distribution of fish collected.

Yankee/otter trawls were conducted in pairs in the northern Newburgh Bay area of the Hudson River (river km 106) during three day-night periods in October 1979. Collections were comprised mostly of young-of-the-year white perch, blueback herring, alewife, and American shad. The otter trawl generally collected fewer fish than the Yankee trawl, as expected; but there were no significant differences ($\alpha = .05$) observed for total catch per unit volume data or for length-frequency distributions of the major species. No consistent statistical differences ($\alpha = .05$) for spatio-temporally partitioned data were detected between the two trawls.

Vertical diurnal migrations were observed for white perch and blueback herring.

The Lake Ontario Salmonid Sportfishery: Some Economic Research Needs

Michael P. Voiland; Sea Grant Office, State University College,
Brockport, New York 14420

The introduction and management of large numbers of artificially-reared Pacific Salmon (Oncorhynchus), trout (Salmo) and char (Salvelinus) in Lake Ontario by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has resulted in the development of a popular sportfishery and growing service industry. A review of recent research efforts indicates that the salmonid restoration program is having major economic effects on the lakeshore community, particularly through stimulation of the retail business sector.

A number of fertile areas for future economic research effort pertaining to Lake Ontario's salmonid sportfishery are identified in this paper. Further research may be needed in the:

- 1) calculation/estimation of community costs in support of fishery promotion, access and development;
- 2) the systematic and objective valuation of the annual, lake-wide salmonid fishing industry;
- 3) the projection of the economic value of a mature salmonid fishery in some future year;
- 4) the determination of local economic impacts stemming from each of the various stocked species;
- 5) the determination of additional economic effects as indicators of fishery value.

It is submitted that economic data/information of these sort could improve management agency, community and private sector business decision-making and planning.

Lake Ontario Sport Fishery: Summary of Spring and Fall 1979 Direct Contact Creel Census

This report provides an annual summary of New York's second year of direct contact creel census in Lake Ontario. Efforts were aimed at providing information on the geographic distributions of angling pressure and developing estimates of total fishing effort and harvest. Two census periods, one extending from April 4 to May 31, 1979 and a second from September 1 to November 2, 1979, were selected to represent the major sport fishery.






TO BERGAMO EAST:
FROM THE WEST: Leave Thruway at Exit 32 (Westmoreland); left beyond toll booth on Cider St. into Oriskany approximately 3 miles. Right on Utica St. to River St. Left, cross NY 69, railroad tracks and two one-lane bridges. Cross over NY 49 and turn right at intersection. Then bear right up hill (Champlainade Road) to Bergamo East.

FROM THE EAST: Leave the Thruway at Exit 31 (Utica). Turn north (right) on NY 8, go 300 yards to second light; turn west (left) on NY 49. NY 49 to Oriskany exit. At end of exit ramp, go straight, then up the hill (Champlainade Rd.) to Bergamo E.

1981 NYAFS ANNUAL MEETING PROGRAM

The success of last year's spirited panel discussion on licensing marine anglers prompted the 1981 Program Committee to invite a distinguished panel to discuss "Environmental Contaminants and the Great Lakes Fisheries". Panelists include Dr. Roger Armstrong, NSF Visiting Scientist to NYSDEC and Professor of Chemistry, Russell Sage College, who will discuss current contaminant levels and trends in Great Lakes fishes; Mr. Wayne Harris, lawyer and sportsman, who will discuss the contaminants problem from a lay-environmentalist perspective; Dr. Nancy Kim, NY Department of Health, who will discuss the risks of Great Lakes fish consumption to humans; Mr. William Pearce, Head NYSDEC Great Lakes Salmonid Program, who will discuss contaminants from a fishery management perspective; and Dr. Fred Coulston, Head of Coulston International Consulting, has been invited to present a chemical industry viewpoint of Great Lakes fishery contaminants. Dr. Steven Gloss, NY Cooperative Fishery Unit Leader, will moderate the panel. An excellent analysis of the Great Lakes contaminants problem - one of critical importance to New York - is anticipated.

The 1981 Evening Program will focus on "Professional Certification: Benefits and Costs." Mr. Carl Sullivan, Executive Director of AFS, will review the history and present status of the AFS certification program; Mr. David McDaniel, Chairman of the Fish Health Section Certification Committee, will discuss the successes and problems associated with the FHS certification program; and Mr. Delano Graff, Chief of Pennsylvania Fisheries, will discuss the benefits and drawbacks of professional certification. The opinions of these nationally known fishery professionals will be of great interest to all professional fishery biologists in New York.

In keeping with recent tradition, the annual meeting will also include two paper sessions. Topics include salmonid movements in the Great Lakes, sport fishery economics, use of PCB's to study eel life history, power plant effects on muskellunge growth, acclimation of brook trout to acid precipitation conditions, cyprinid habitat preference and food habits and many other subjects of interest to New York aquatic biologists. Departing from tradition, there will be a short business meeting and a prime rib supper.

The 1981 Program committee looks forward to bringing this program to you and urges all NY Chapter members and other interested persons to come to the annual meeting at Bergamo.

Dear Mr. Chiotti,

I have received both your letter of March 11th and March 13. No apology was necessary. I can understand your concern. I worked for the NYS Conservation Dept. as an Aquatic Biologist for eight years.

Answering your letter was postponed until I had a chance to read the article you referred to by Richard L. Pycha in Vol. 37, No. 11, Nov. 1980 Proceedings of the Sea Lamprey International Symposium, a Special Issue of the Canadian Journal of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences. I not only read that article but also all the other papers in that issue that concerned the evaluation of lampreys as a causative agent in the lake trout decline and subsequent increase in population in the Great Lakes. My comments on the Pycha paper and some of the other papers appearing in the same publication are as follows:

1. There were so many "ifs" and "assumptions" in Mr. Pycha's data and logic, that at best his conclusions would have to be considered highly speculative.

2. Theoretic calculations, alone, are no substitute for actual measurements. I would not base a program envolving many thousands of dollars on such calculations from only one author.

3. All but one of the other professionals at the Sea Lamprey Symposium indicated that the cause of the lake trout decline could have been either or both an increase in sea lampreys or overfishing for the lake trout. The remaining author (Swanson et al) assigned a very low percentage rate (6%) to lamprey induced mortality, indicated a natural mortality of 20 % and a harvest by fisherman of 7.3 %.

4. Bill Youngs concluded that in Cayuga Lake "lampreys did not apparently cause appreciable mortality in 4-year-old lake trout and older". (What kind of "control" lake would that be if

you suspected that lampreys were a major cause of lake trout mortality in Seneca Lake.)

In order to scientifically determine the roll of the sea lamprey as a mortality inducing predator, wouldn't it be desirable to make actual estimates of the numbers of this critter in a lake? It would require a tagging and recovery effort of some sort. That, I realize, is a real challenge and requires some new technology. And, may in fact turn out to be impossible.

It would also be interesting to work on these questions:

1. What caused the lamprey population in the Great Lakes to suddenly increase?

2. What are the natural predators and diseases that limit lamprey populations in New York waters? (Lamsa et al in the above proceedings stated, "Developement of alternate and supplemental control methods are essential since chemicals cannot be used indefinitely.")

3. Would it not be just as fruitful in Seneca Lake to greatly increase the stocking of lake trout and see if the incidence of scarring decreases as the lake trout population increases? It would take the Department off the "hook" with the sportsmen and certainly produce as much new information as a lampricide treatment that is also aimed at reducing the incidence of scarring on lake trout. It would also placate the "envircnmentalists" and produce more lake trout for the angler.

If I were the present Commissioner of Conservation, I think I would consider this later alternative, accompanied by an effort to obtain good population estimates of the lake trout as the years go by. I would also release at least a small amount of money to investigate methods of catching parasitic stages of the sea lamprey in Seneca Lake at the same time. If successfull, a program could be started to obtain more accurate estimates of the lamprey population. More data on the ability of lake trout to survive lamprey attacks would be desirable.


In the meantime, you may wish to consider presenting a motion at the next Annual Meeting of the NY Chapter of the AFS to rescind or modify the 1978 action that allows the Executive Committee to make a position statement.

It goes without saying, however, that any statement by the Executive Committee will never satisfy all the members. But, is that really of concern? All the motions passed at our meetings are valid if a majority of the members present agree and vote in the affirmative (with the exception of those few instances that require a 2/3 vote). That means that up to 49 % may disagree.

I would hazard a guess that there are a number of people in the Conservation Department who agree with the Executive Committee's statement about the proposed lampricide treatment in Seneca Lake.

Your letter of March 11th may turn out to be the catalyst that produces some very important answers relative to lake trout and lampreys in New York State.



2. Annual dues for Members shall be five dollars (\$5.00), except that dues for full-time students shall be two dollars (\$2.00). Dues shall be payable at the beginning of each calendar year to the Secretary-Treasurer. Dues of new members shall be payable when application for membership is accepted. Membership not paid on or before July 1 shall be considered lapsed and shall forfeit shall not receive publications of the Chapter and shall forfeit all rights and privileges of membership as long as dues are

(1) Distinguished Service and (2) Exofficio. Honorary Members shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of Members, except that Exofficio Members shall not vote or hold office.

(b) Honorary Member: Persons who, by reason of professional or other attainments, outstanding service to the Chapter, or official position, shall be eligible for election as an Honorary Member upon nomination by two or more Chapter Members in good standing, and a 2/3 vote of the members present at an annual meeting, and upon election shall be exempt from payment of dues. There shall be two classes of honorary membership:

2. The objectives of the Chapter shall be those of the American Fisheries Society as set forth in Article I of its Constitution, and to encourage the exchange of information by members of the Society within the State of

1. The name of this organization shall be the New York Chapter of the American Fisheries Society, hereinafter referred to as the Chapter.

Section 1 - Name and Objectives

BYLAWS OF THE NEW YORK CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN FISHERIES SOCIETY

Section 4 - Officers

The officers of the Chapter shall consist of a President, President-Elect, Secretary-Treasurer and Secretary-Treasurer-Elect.

The President-Elect and the Secretary-Treasurer-Elect shall be elected at the annual meeting. The Secretary-Treasurer shall hold office for two years, but the term of the other officers shall be one year. The Secretary-Treasurer-Elect shall be elected in alternate years. In case of a vacant position, the Executive Committee shall appoint a qualified replacement to fill an unexpired term. The incumbent (not newly elected) President-Elect and Secretary-Treasurer-Elect shall succeed to the office of President and Secretary-Treasurer, respectively, at the expiration of the terms of those officers.

In the event of a cancellation of an annual meeting at which election of officers was scheduled, the officers and the members of any committee shall continue to serve until the next scheduled meeting.

Section 5 - Duties of Officers

The President-Elect shall preside at all meetings, serve as Chairman at the Executive Committee, represent the Chapter on the Northeastern Executive Committee and in the American Fisheries Society, make appointments and perform other duties and functions as are authorized and necessary. The Chapter shall reimburse the President, for registration fees and housing expenses at the annual meeting of the American Fisheries Society. The Chapter shall represent the President in all matters and affairs of the Chapter, or an alternative designated by the President, for registration fees and housing expenses at the annual meeting of the American Fisheries Society, or an apportionments and perform other duties and functions as are authorized and necessary. The Chapter shall reimburse the President, for registration fees and housing expenses at the annual meeting of the American Fisheries Society. The Chapter shall keep the official records of the Chapter, collect and be custodian of registration fees, dues and any funds which may be allotted to the Chapter. The Secretary-Treasurer shall disburse funds as may be authorized by the Executive Committee or the membership, submit a record of receipts and disbursements at the annual meeting, and perform such duties as may be requested by the Chapter Past-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Secretary-Treasurer-Elect and President-Elect, Presidents of standing committees and ad hoc committees shall be non-voting members of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee is authorized to act for the Chapter between meetings and to perform appropriate duties and functions.

Section 6 - Executive Committee

The Secretary-Treasurer-Elect shall aid the Secretary-Treasurer in his duties and act at the direction of the Secretary-Treasurer and the President.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall consist of the Chapter officers (President, President-Elect, Secretary-Treasurer, Secretary-Treasurer-Elect) and officials of the Northeastern Division. The Chapter shall keep the official records of the Chapter, collect and be custodian of registration fees, dues and any funds which may be allotted to the Chapter. The Secretary-Treasurer shall disburse funds as may be authorized by the Executive Committee or the membership, submit a record of receipts and disbursements at the annual meeting, and perform such duties as may be requested by the Chapter Past-President, Presidents of standing committees and ad hoc committees of the Northeastern Division.

(The New York Chapter By-Laws received Executive Committee, American Fisheries Society, approval on February 10, 1981.)

The By-Laws of the Chapter may be amended in accordance with Section 8 of these By-Laws, provided that prior notice of at least 30 days be given to the membership of the proposed change(s). Said change(s) must be approved by the Executive Committee of the Society before taking effect.

Section 10 - Amendments of the By-Laws

The Executive Committee may assess each registrant attending meetings of the Chapter a registration fee necessary to cover the costs of the meeting and chapter activities. Collections shall be made by the Secretary-Treasurer or a representative appointed by that officer.

Section 9 - Registration

A quorum for the transaction of official business shall be 20 of the chapter's voting members.

Decisions at meetings of the Chapter shall be by a majority of those voting, except that amendments to the By-Laws require a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority, and excepted further, the election of Honorary Members requires a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote. Any member in good standing who cannot attend a meeting may request the Executive Committee in writing to register a vote on a previous duly noticed meeting. Such a vote shall be counted with the votes of members present. Such votes shall not be used to determine a quorum. Proxy votes must be received by the Secretary-Treasurer before the annual meeting at which the vote is taken.

Section 8 - Voting and Quorum

The term of office for members of the Chapter Committees shall end upon the discharge of their duties for which they were appointed, or at the next annual meeting of the Chapter, whichever comes first.

The committees of the Chapter shall end in the operation of their duties. They may also be directed by vote of the membership at an annual meeting.

The committees shall be composed of the chairman and any other members in good standing. The committees shall aid the President in their chapter business and activities. The President shall direct them in their operations and activities. They may also be directed by vote of the membership at an annual meeting.

Section 7 - Chapter Committees

Committees and chairmen of Committees, except as listed in Section 5 and 6, shall be appointed by the President. Standing Committees shall include: Auditing, Environmental Concerns, Membership, Nominating, Professional Standards, Program, and Resolutions.
